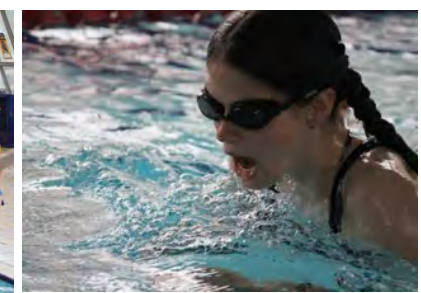


AQUATICS MORNING

YEAR 10 CAITLINS CAMP

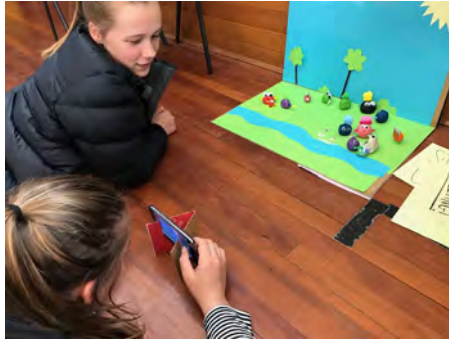
